





### FROGKISSER! by Garth Nix

Aided by a loyal talking dog, a boy trapped in the body of a newt, and some mischievous wizards, Anya sets off on a Quest that, if she plays it right, will ultimately free her land—and teach her a thing or two about the use of power, the effectiveness of a well-placed pucker, and the finding of friends in places both high and low.

### ME AND EARL AND THE DYING GIRL by Jesse Andrews
